Senior Pastor's Note

I recently stumbled upon an article that was unusual for me. I had been listening to author and pastor John Ortberg, and he mentioned the history of the word "thanks." What he said made me run to the Google machine and search for more information. He said that the root or origin of the word "thank" is the same as the origin of the word "think."

I found an article by Justin Richards entitled, "Giving Thanks: Heidegger's Pathway into Thinking." Heidegger was a German thinker who was trying to understand what thinking really was. This topic is very far rom my typical daily readings – German philosophers are not ny normal speed! As I read the first paragraph, I thought, "Oh, boy, I'm not going to make it." But I labored on and read this:

"To give thanks means more than the mere performative utterance of saying thank you...pure thanks is rather that we simply think – think what is really and solely given, what is there to be thought. To give thanks one must first be thankful, that is to say, be filled with gratitude."

I pushed myself away from the article and began to let my mind absorb this statement. Like many of you, I was taught from an early age to say "thank you." It didn't come naturally. Think of any baby you have been around. While they are precious and cute, they take a lot without giving a thing. They aren't gracious beings on their own. Gratitude is a learned skill, and it is something that only becomes natural as it is practiced – as it is put into play regularly.

The apostle Paul said that humanity has been given the gift of seeing God through all that has been created. God's invisible nature and power is on display at each sunrise and sunset. It is there in the cool autumn weather and the horses we can watch running across Kentucky hills. Paul is saying, "Look, God is all around," but then he warns us that we become foolish when we ignore God and refuse to give thanks. For Paul, ignoring God and refusing to give thanks are synonymous.

If thanking only occurs when I'm thinking, then how often do I actually give thanks to the One who has given me everything? I want to invite us to pause during the upcoming holiday season and not just rush through a quick "one thing I'm thankful for" during a meal. Instead, let's choose to think and thank.

I'm thankful for you. I'm thankful for our church and for another year together. I'm thankful that God's goodness has been lavished on us. And I'm thankful...for a pause...that says there will be new mercies and new ways to see God's goodness all around.

...leaving a legacy has nothing to do with wealth?

A legacy doesn't depend upon the size of the gift. It results from simply taking the action necessary to combine your love of the church and its ministries with an actual plan to include the church in your will.

...84% of people who attend church give to it financially, but only 7% include the church in their will or estate plan?

Financial Condition

Southern Hills UMC and Southern Hills Early Childhood Program (SHECP) continue to be financially stable even though we show a \$164,000 deficit for 2022 year to date. However, if we had not received funds from the American Rescue Plan we would have an additional \$605,000 deficit for a total deficit of \$769,000. Offsetting that some, payroll expense for SHECP is up to \$400,000 year to date. The church does continue to need to control our spending. This continues to be very difficult in the face of rising costs and inflation. Our 2023 budget will have to address these issues, and I anticipate a long and difficult budget process.

*Note: Through October is 83% of the year. Income or expense percentage over 83% is over budget.
